A new course with Visiting Professor of Religion Chris Haskett will examine the many interactions between children's literature and religion. Through the *Bible* and *Rāmāyana*, classics like *The Chronicles of Narnia*, and new favorites such as *Harry Potter* and *His Dark Materials*, we explore new territory in a new way to find out how "kid lit" and religion inform one another. The course also reaches out to lesser known authors such as *Kashmira Sheth*, *Gloria Whelan*, and *Isabel Allende* through the lens of theorists like *Foucault* and *Said*.

Prerequisites: An open mind. No prior knowledge of religion or children's books is necessary.
